Located on the 6th and 7th floors of the San Diego Central Library, e3 Civic High serves more than 300 students in grades 9-12. The curriculum is designed to engage students through internships, community service and college courses at local college and universities. Embracing a flexible school day, internship opportunities and hands-on learning, the design for e3 Civic High—which stands for Engage, Educate and Empower—demonstrates the value of creating personalized learning spaces. The co-location of a charter high school within a public library is also unprecedented and offers extensive opportunities for collaboration, as both organizations support a mission of lifelong learning and literacy. The curriculum incorporates internships and other real-world experiences with downtown businesses, organizations and facilities. Local college students and library staff augment the faculty by mentoring students and teaching them research skills. Students choose one of the school's two pre-professional pathways: biomedical health or digital media. Students can graduate with both a high school diploma and a community college degree.

e3 Civic High School is the first of its kind. Co-located on the 6th and 7th floors of the new San Diego Central Library in downtown, the LEED Gold charter school is sought to not only fill a need in providing the San Diego community with an accessible educational resource, but to do so in a way that would organically push the limits on the definition of a classroom.

The school's "Learning Studios" are organized in Villages named after specific, nearby areas such as Little Italy, Balboa Park, and East Village. Designed to promote collaboration, most of the rooms have modular glass walls and movable furniture intended to facilitate collaboration among students and between students and teachers. The design principles for the learning environment centralized around three ideas: personalization, social connections and flexibility. The design process includes extensive research in technology and furniture solutions that enhance 21st Century learning opportunities within the space.




